Financial Aid

FAFSA www.fafsa.ed.gov

The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) is the free federal form required by almost all colleges for financial assistance. The form is to be filled out annually by current and anticipating college students to determine their eligibility for federal student financial aid. Students and parents may file online through the website to save weeks in notification time.

Federal Student Aid PIN www.pin.ed.gov

A government PIN is required to access and complete the FAFSA online. Your PIN can be used each year to electronically apply for federal student aid and to access your Federal Student Aid records online. If you receive a PIN, you agree not to share it with anyone. Your PIN serves as your electronic signature and provides access to your personal records, so you should never give your PIN to anyone, including commercial services that offer to help you complete your FAFSA. Be sure to keep your PIN in a safe place.

FAFSA4caster www.FederalStudentAid.ed.gov

The Federal Student Aid website is the source for free information, guidance and tools for federal student assistance. Available on the website is the FAFSA4caster – a Financial Aid Forecaster developed to help students and families assess their eligibility for college financial aid during the student's junior year in high school. Families enter financial information into the 4caster, a simplified version of the FAFSA form, and receive an Estimated Family Contribution (EFC) as well as information about paying for post-secondary education. Students and families interested in assessing their eligibility for federal student aid can access FAFSA4caster. The links for the FAFSA4caster are located in the lower right corner of the home page.
